The outbreak of COVID-19 last winter came unexpectedly and without a plan to address a global pandemic. Using all our resources, including outreach to our committed community, we quickly responded to meet this challenge, enabling ongoing service to our clients without interruption. Together we do. Our doors are open, our shelves are stocked and our hearts are filled with gratitude. A year ago it would have been unfathomable to predict, let alone prepare for, the cataclysmic event that would befall our families, our community, and our country. Yet, due to your swift and steadfast response, there was never a single moment of hesitation from the Board that the food cupboard would remain open and serving our community throughout the pandemic.

Together we serve. Over these eight months, we have been able to meet the increasing needs of our existing households and respond to the many new requests for assistance. Volunteers, working out of our space in the UCC basement, are pre-packing the groceries for the 80 households relying on us for support. Each distribution is a sight to behold with over 400 bags of food "filled to the brim" covering the entire floor in Fellowship Hall. In addition to offering curbside pick-up, we are delivering groceries to more than 30 homes including the elderly, clients who lack transportation or those who have compromised health.

Together we continue. We are currently serving over 200 Medfield residents, the largest number in our history. There is no telling how much demand will grow, but we face these uncertainties with optimism and confidence, knowing with you at our side, our mission to provide food security to our neighbors in need is unassailable. We will continue to help the many individuals in our community struggling with financial hardships put food on their tables in the year ahead.
